

KINGSBORO CHURCH

Kingsboro Church is an active congregation dedicated to building Healthy Christians, Healthy Families, and a Healthy Church. This current day congregation is housed in the Historic Kingsboro Church building. They have dedicated themselves to curating the history surrounding the Historic 1838 church building and the church owned Historic Kingsboro Cemetery. Stop by and see history being preserved while still being used as it was originally intended, a place of worship, a place of prayer, a place of healing, and home to the congregation at Kingsboro.

HISTORIC KINGSBORO CEMETERY

Take a walk through the Historic Kingsboro Cemetery. View the monument dedicated to the early founders of Kingsboro. Stop by the graves of several Veterans of the American Revolution including Elisha Judson who was captured at Fort Washington in 1776 and was held prisoner on a British prison ship until 1778 and Jedediah Ayers who served as part of George Washington's personal Life Guards. See the monument marking the original place where Revolutionary War and War of 1812 Hero Nicholas Stoner was buried. American Flags mark headstones surrounded by many other stones placed in memory of the early settlers of Kingsboro. People like Rev. Elisha Yale, Pastor of the Kingsboro Church at the time of its construction.

The History of Kingsboro is the History of Early America

The Kingsboro Church and the Historic Early American Cemetery were added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1975 as part of the Kingsboro Historic District.

Several veterans of the American Revolution are buried in the Kingsboro Cemetery.

The Kingsboro Church was built in 1838 to replace the original circa 1793 wooden structure. The congregation at Kingsboro, led by Elisha Yale, was instrumental in the early settlement, education, and spiritual growth of the area.

The Kingsboro Church is the oldest church in Gloversville and its congregation is still active in the community.
